Welcome to the Student Assistance Center! Our new school counselor, Mrs. Arlisa Crank-Townsend, has been busy establishing relationships with students through individual counseling sessions and small group and classroom guidance lessons. Our new Comprehensive School Counseling Program was developed based upon survey results by parents, students and teachers. Students are receiving services to prepare them for a successful academic, personal, social/emotional, college and career life. The services include:



- Weekly and bi-weekly one-on-one <u>counseling sessions</u> help students gain an awareness of themselves and the world around them. This is a safe and private place for students to talk about the thoughts and experiences they do not understand. With the help of an adult who listens without judgement, students benefit from learning life-long skills and strategies to help them successfully manage life circumstances. Additionally, students review their current grades and determine ways to improve.
- Weekly classroom <u>guidance lessons</u> focus on topics selected by parents, students and teachers as the top priorities for success in life. Guidance lessons provide students an opportunity to participate as a community of learners focused on preparing to live and work in the 21st Century.
- <u>College and Careers</u> explorations require students to identify their interests, talents and skills through a series of assessment inventories. During the months of November and December, students are completing the Career Interest Inventory as an introduction to college and career readiness.
- <u>Small Groups</u> run up to 5 weeks in duration and are made up of 6-10 students with similar needs and/or interests. Group sessions will begin in January and will cover topics including, but not limited to, selfesteem, making friends, good decision-making, loss and grief, divorce, parent-child relationships, anxiety and stress, depression, and my life matters.
- <u>Parent/Teacher/Student Conferences</u> are conducted using a team approach. The main focus is the success of the student! We discuss all factors affecting a student's overall school progress. Parents are the first teacher, and we heavily rely on parents to help us understand the needs of their child(ren). Students are active participants and help make decisions about their educational career.
- <u>Business Partnerships</u> are critical to the advancement of our school and its mission to prepare students for life after high school. If you are interested in sharing your knowledge and talents with our students, please contact our school counselor. We will host our Annual College-to-Career Fair during second semester. It will be our privilege to have you share about your education, training and career.

Attendance Goal

The Gila River Indian Community, along with the Tribal Education Department, has set goals for Community schools through an initiative to improve education in Gila River. In support of the inititiave, SESD will be providing an end-of-year incentive to students who have good attendance

throughout the school year. 2 iPads will be given away to students via a drawing at both the elementary and middle school. Students who have good attendance for each school quarter will be eligible (2 or less excused absences per quarter). This means that a student can have 4 entries in the drawing if they meet the criteria each quarter. Providing EXCEPTIONAL student services: Mission Possible for the ESS staff!

The Arizona <u>State Performance Plan</u> contains an indicator that reports parent involvement in the special education process. Indicator 8: Parent Involvement—requires ADE/ESS to annually submit survey data on the percentage of parents with a child receiving special education services who report that schools facilitated parent involvement as a means of improving services and results for children with disabilities. All districts/charter schools in the state must give every parent/guardian of a student with an Individualized Education Program (IEP) survey instructions and a login code. The window for the parent survey ends on May 31, 2019.

What does this mean for Sacaton Elementary School District parents and staff?

The ESS Office has printed off each letter for the parents/students that have been issued a login code. This list is based on last year's enrollment. The ESS Office will mail the letters home to the parents. Case managers will also maintain a copy of the letter in case any parent needs another copy. Case managers will also be able to use the information to assist parents with taking the survey. The parent letter contains information about how to complete the parent survey. If the parent does not have access to a computer, smart phone, or tablet, they can use any school computer to complete the survey. The case manager can also use the letter at any upcoming IEP meetings to assist the parent with taking the survey at that time.

Tailored Technology Report

Reading is so important to our lives. We need it to understand the world around us, but also because it's something that we love to do. That love of reading doesn't always happen immediately for everyone. I remember reading as a chore. It was hard and I didn't like it all. However, something changed for me around the age of ten...my grandmother's encouragement. She had me reading all the time. You don't get good at something unless you practice, practice, and oh yeah, practice some more. Once I became good at reading, reading for fun and enjoyment was the next logical step. That love of reading is what we want for our children, but to get there we have to look at different ways of motivating and challenging each one to do it.

Motivation is different for everyone. Some students read because they love it. Students who struggle with reading need our help to find their motivator. Many times student motivation for reading is linked with their reading confidence level or personal interests. Here at Sacaton Elementary School District, we have a reading program that addresses both of these areas. It is called the myON reading program.

The myON reading program provides a personalized way for students to be motivated by their reading accomplishments. Students can see how many books they have read, how much time they are spending on reading, and even their Lexile growth (reading level). All of these tools are excellent for self-motivation. In addition, the myON teacher dashboard allows educators to review their students' data quickly and to take the time to talk to their students about their progress. Teachers see the results immediately and the students are able to receive immediate feedback from not only the program, but also from their teachers. The program is webbased so that anyone who has a connection to the internet can access the program. At Sacaton Elementary School District every student has an account that can be used year long. Yes, that includes the summer vacation time, too. The program even allows students to download books to their smart devices (iPhone, Android phones, iPads, Chromebooks, tablets, etc.) so that they can read while offline. Currently the myON library contains over 6,500 books, and if needed, we can expand this online digital library. Diabetes and Prevention

Know the Signs and Symptoms

- Hunger- at times extreme, and associated with weight loss
- Increased thirst
- **Increased urination** ("accidents" in a toddler and older children previously toilet trained or more frequent diaper changes in infants)
- Fatigue
- Irritability or unusual behavior
- Blurry vision

If untreated, the following symptoms can occur that require immediate medical care!

- Nausea
- Vomiting
- Belly pain
- Rapid breathing and drowsiness
- Loss of consciousness

Prevention and Risks:

Risks can include: Having relatives who have diabetes, and being overweight or obese. Talk to your pediatrician about concerns and take your child in for regular check-ups. GRIC Tribal Education Receives Grant

The Gila River Indian Community's Tribal Education Department was recently awarded the Native Arts Initiative Grant to fund the "Sewing Through the Ages" Project. This project is aimed at teaching the basics of sewing to families within the Community. Beginning in 2019, families will take part in 8 sewing classes with Master Sewers from the Community and a final show. Families that participate will be provided with all materials and be able to take home their own sewing machine after participating in all of the classes. There will be limited spots available so be sure to keep an eye out for registration information to be a part of this project.

Legacy Community Orchard Update



It is with joy and humility that our Legacy Community Orchard is thriving and ALIVE! As with any growth, there are some painful moments. October's high temperatures affected some of the fruit and burst the skins of some lemons. Additionally, early cold November temperatures injured some orange trees and we have lost 3 plum trees. However, they are under warranty and will be replaced. SESD was gifted 75 cubic yards of composted wood chips from Greenwaste Recycling in Gilbert, AZ. Also Pima-Maricopa Irrigation Project (P-MIP) will be providing almost 80 Cubic yards of wood chips to start our own composting project later this year. Mr. Trotter, Food Service Director, is helping Mr. Alaniz learn how to

compost. A school wide vegetative waste initiative is underway to help with waste material from our cafeteria.

Students are actively distributing compost to the tree wells that helps them understand volume as a quantity of measure. This understanding of how much mulch per tree, measured in cubic feet, provides hands-on math and science principles. Having the mulch in the tree wells mitigates weed growth and ultimately provides vital nitrogen and other essential nutrients for orchard maintenance.

SESD was named as a state finalist by Samsung Electronics in the STEM "2019 Solve for Tomorrow Contest." The project challenge is to create a non-lethal rodent trap to be used in our Legacy Community Orchard. The design will use Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) to help solve the problem. The state winner will receive a \$20,000 technology package from Samsung. We are honored to have been able to participate and move on to the next phase of the competition.

Skills for Early Reading

Phonological Awareness are skills students must learn to master reading which include listening skills, rhyme and alliteration, sentence segmentation, syllable blending and segmenting, onset rime blending and segmenting, and phonemic awareness. Phonemic Awareness is a crucial pre-reading skill that is taught and assessed to ensure that students can hear and manipulate sounds.



Some activities you can do with your young child(ren) at home to increase Phonological Awareness are playing rhyming games or say rhyming words at home. The words can be make believe as long as they rhyme. Saying or signing Nursey Rhymes can help children build awareness of sound patterns of language and plays an important role in a child's linguistic and early literacy development. While hearing and recounting nursery rhymes, children are developing crucial early literacy skills.
